

## Inspiration Ridge Preserve Coordinator (Summer 2023)

Located on the ridge overlooking Kachemak Bay, Inspiration Ridge Preserve is a 693-acre mosaic of forests, bogs, meadows, ponds, and creeks, with over 8 miles of trails. The IRP Coordinator will lead a team of two naturalists in running interpretive natural history hikes and workshops, monitoring wildlife, and performing trail maintenance. In addition to creating work schedules and providing mentorship to the naturalist team, the IRP Coordinator will coordinate with stakeholders, including the IRP Property Manager and the CACS year-round staff, through regular meetings. Applicants can expect to split their time fairly evenly between outdoor work (leading hikes/workshops, data collection, trail maintenance) and indoor computer work (creating schedules, sending emails, program prep, database management, social media, running meetings).

### Training & Mentorship

- Participate in paid Master Naturalist training at the Peterson Bay Field Station at the start of the summer, which will include training on natural sciences, Alaska Native cultures, and nature interpretation.
- Opportunities throughout the summer for paid professional development.



### Core duties:

- Create schedules, provide mentorship, and lead daily activities for the IRP naturalist team.
- Plan and lead guided hikes, ranging from 1.5 to 3 hours, for a range of group sizes and ages. Frequency of hikes varies, with an average of two guided hikes per week.
- Develop biweekly or weekly educational workshops and activities for adults and youth.
- Conduct monitoring of wildlife and invasive species, which includes hiking, operating motion-triggered wildlife cameras, properly identifying plants/wildlife/scat/tracks (training provided), and recording observations in a computer database.
- Create and update interpretive and educational materials.
- Trail maintenance & invasive species removal. This can involve hiking for up to 5 miles carrying weed whips and other equipment.

### Qualifications

- Self-starter, organized, ability to work both independently and as part of a team.
- Experience leading small teams of educators, volunteers, or interns (preferred).
- Experience working with youth and adults in outdoor settings.
- Experience conducting scientific monitoring/research.
- Good organizational skills and ability to keep track of multiple tasks and responsibilities.

- Comfort working, hiking, and living in a semi-remote location.
- Physical ability to hike up to 5 miles carrying up to 30 pounds of equipment.
- Knowledge of or strong interest in forest ecology, botany, watersheds, wildlife habitat, and human uses of plants.
- Knowledge of or demonstrated interest in Alaska Native cultures, particularly Dena'ina and Sugpiaq/Alutiiq ethnobotany and land stewardship.
- Willingness to learn on the job and to adjust and adapt readily to changing circumstances (such as weather, group needs, etc.)
- Strong communication skills, with the ability to provide clear, concise directions, communicate complex science concepts, communicate well with diverse stakeholders, and make people feel welcome.
- Interest or experience in cartography and GIS (preferred).
- Commitment to CACS's work towards justice, equity, diversity and inclusion in our programs.
- Demonstrated good judgment and experience with risk management in challenging backcountry settings, including first aid and CPR certification (with preference for Wilderness First Aid or Wilderness First Responder certification)
